Can you describe the workforce in anaesthesia and intensive care in your country in terms of gender representation? Total number of Anaesthesist/Intensivists, how many are male/female?

Data were updated on 31 Dec 2020:

- Registered medical doctors: 47.674, 23.109 are female (48%)
- Registered specialists for anaesthesiology and intensive care
  - total 3.178: 1.455 female (46%), range 37-51% in federal states
- · Total registered trainees in anaesthesiology and intensive care
  - total 721: 319 female (44%)

When statistics of 1990 were compared to 2020, the percentage of women in anaesthesiology was stable at 45% vs. 46%.

## Is the gender equity accepted as one of the policies within anaesthesia and intensive care in your country?

- The ÖGARI has a "Womens' Forum"
- Since 2007, the ÖGARI has continuously had a board member dedicated to gender issues.
- Gender distribution is transparently shown in statistics of the Austrian Chamber of Physicians.

### Women in anaesthesia and intensive care during the pandemic: Who were the heroines?


Several women were (and continue to be) present in the national media:

- · ... several others who are not listed here...


Dr. Rebana Scherzer (Vienna) conducted 2 successful PR initiatives on "Voices of Trainees regarding COVID-19" with large dissemination in the Austrian media.

Are women in the leadership positions? How are they represented in the places of power?

- How many are chairs in anaesthesiology/intensive care vs. overall departments)?
  - As of January 2021, 116 chairs total, 13 of which are female (11%), ranging from 0 to 50% in departments.
- · How many have any academic position? No data
- How many are board chairs and members in the relevant national society?
  - Board members: 5 of 20 are female (25%)
